Paul's Ponderings...

From Darkness to Light

Long before there were Christians inhabiting this earth, people gathered to celebrate the Winter Solstice which occurs this year on Thursday, December 21, at 11:28 a.m. Winter Solstice happens in the Northern Hemisphere when, because of the earth's tilt on its axis, the North Pole is the farthest away from the sun, rendering it the shortest day and longest night of the year. Ancient rituals and traditions were developed to note this special day called "The Longest Night" and the early belief was that if the god of the sun was not properly honored with certain festivities that it might not return.

These pagan Winter Solstice traditions were part of a bigger celebration called Yule, and differed depending on where you lived. Originally the Longest Night was observed to pray to the gods that there was enough food to last through the Winter. In pre–16th century northern Europe feasts were a big part of the festivities, particularly because locals had just killed their cattle to

avoid having to feed them during the winter. In Scandinavia, the Feast of Juul (Yule) included the burning of a Yule log, which took place over 12 days to honor the sun's rebirth. The Feast of Saturnalia, the Ancient Roman tradition, included feasting and gift giving.

Sound familiar? As you can tell, many of these rituals became modern-day Christmas traditions and have become just another example of how Christians borrowed from the ancient pagans to develop their annual celebrations.

Over the past years the Longest Night celebration continued to evolve and be modified by the church into what was called "Blue Christmas", an Advent celebration to be held on or near December 21st. The image of darkness that the Longest Night brings to mind reminded us that everyone is not overjoyed with the Christmas spirit each year. Some of us have suffered great loss the preceding year...downsizing led to the loss of a job, moving led to the loss of community, death led to the loss of a loved

one. The church recognized that for some, Christmas was not "the haphap-happiest season of all" but a time of mental "darkness" and responded by developing a healing service appropriately called Blue Christmas.

At this Chapel we as a community of faith have continued to develop our understanding of the Longest Night and Blue Christmas into a celebration that moves us "From Darkness to Light." We recognize that Advent is when we celebrate the fact that God chooses to bring the world's greatest hope into the very darkness of life that weighs us down most days but especially during the Christmas season when we may be sad but feel forced to put on a happy seasonal smile.

Maybe this year isn't your year of feeling hopeless — maybe you're ready for a holly jolly Christmas with all of the trimmings. But, being Christian means thinking of others besides yourself. And being a Christian during Advent means being willing to stand in the darkness with others because that's where Emmanuel promises to show up first. While Advent for many churches is little more than a pre-Christmas celebration with festive traditions and rituals, at our Chapel, From Darkness to Light gives space for the real meaning of Christmas — our saving hope promises to come as a light that our darkest moments cannot conquer.

If you need a time to quietly and meditatively celebrate the advent of our Lord Jesus and if you choose to stand with those who face the darkness this Christmas season, then I invite you to our service called, From Darkness to Light on Thursday, December 5th, at 5:00 to be followed by our traditional covered-dish soup, bread, and dessert supper.

Tax free donations to the Chapel

IRA Minimum Distributions. If you're age 70 ½ or older, you must take a minimum distribution (4%) from your IRA each year and pay income tax on the amount of your withdrawal. However, you can make a "tax-free" charitable contribution from your IRA to the Chapel. The money must be sent directly from your IRA account to the chapel to qualify.
