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Paul's Ponderings The Chapel Chimes October 2021

In the September issue of The Chapel Chimes I shared with you my ponderings on the topic of "belonging" and how the relationships that we form through time with family, friends, and community produce a sense of belonging that has the ability to delay mental and physical decline which leads to happier and longer lives. If you would like to read or review that article you will find it on the Chapel website.

Exploring "belonging" reminded me of the writing of one of my favorite church historians, Diana Butler-Bass. She writes, "For the last few centuries, Western Christianity ordered faith in a particular way. Catholics and Protestants taught that belief came first, behavior came next, and finally belonging resulted... Believe, behave, belong." The first step in Christian discipleship is to believe in Christ Jesus, then to order our lives around his teachings, and finally to belong to a particular community of faith.

While I am still pondering "belonging" let me remind everyone that Jesus did not begin with the question of belief. Jesus' public ministry began when he called out, "Follow me" and his

friends and neighbors left their old lives to form a new community. Jesus did not begin with "belief" but with an invitation to new relationships based on love and service. Christianity began with "belonging" and moved to "behaving".

The early folks who followed Jesus were a community of practice. Dr. Butler-Bass writes, "Jesus' followers did not sit around a fire and listen to lectures on Christian theology. They listened to stories that taught them how to act toward one another, what to do in the world." And, so, they responded with "behavior" not "belief". They healed people, offered hospitality, prayed together, challenged traditional practices and rituals, ministered to the sick, comforted the grieving, fasted, and forgave.

Jesus began by calling people into a new community of belonging and when they responded he gave them something to do. At first, he demonstrated what he wanted them to do. Then he did it with them. Finally, he sent them out to do it themselves...telling them to proclaim God's reign and cure the sick. When the disciples returned from their first mission trip they realized that proclaiming the kingdom was not a matter of teaching doctrine...not a matter of belief... rather, the kingdom was a matter

of imitating Jesus' actions. It was a matter of "behaving".

I think that it is possible that Jesus wanted us to know that actions shape faith. Spiritual practices engender hope. Behavior opens the door to believing. Embedding yourself within a Christian community and doing what Christians do leads to believing what Christians believe. Doing what seems difficult or even impossible empowers us with the courage to envision a different world and believe that we can make a difference for God. Without community, without belonging...without practices, without behavior...faith is but an empty promise.

Belonging...behaving...and that leaves "believing" on which to ponder between now and November's Chapel Chimes.

On October 31, 1517, a monk named Martin Luther tacked a piece of paper to the front entrance of the local church in Wittenberg, Germany, triggering decades of argument and even war over the ideas he recorded on that piece of paper. Luther had hoped to prompt changes within the Roman Catholic Church, but was excommunicated from the church just four years later, and eventually fled Germany when a bounty was placed on his life. The ninety-five practices he condemned within the church sparked what is referred to in history as The Protestant Reformation, and was the beginning of the Protestant church throughout the world, in its many denominations and forms. Martin Luther was able to spread the ideas of his initial protest throughout Europe with a relatively recent invention, Johannes Gutenberg's movable type printing press. Also utilizing the "power of the press," Luther shared Bible teachings in brochures, and through hymns he composed to encourage believers who were suffering through atrocious persecutions.

One of Luther's best known and most powerful hymns is "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." Every historical era has its own struggles and hardships, but as The Preacher says in the book of Ecclesiastes, "Nothing is new under the sun." Listen to the inspiring words set to the tune of Ein' Feste Burg, and be reminded that, "God's truth abideth still; His kingdom is forever."

We are going to have the sidewalk, in the center courtyard, that runs along the outside of the fellowship hall, raised back up and tilted away from the building. At the same time, the void underneath the sidewalk will be filled. All this will happen September 30, 2021, and the process has been approved by the Board. It comes with a warrantee from a very well known company and proven process. After that, we are going to reroute the two downspouts that descend in front of the offices.

All the outside light timers have been reset so that they come on when darkness approaches.

Finance Team Report (Submitted by Dick Van Horne)



"Stewardship Season" has arrived at Chapel in the Pines. As you consider your 2022 pledge, here are some ideas for making gifting easier:

Online Giving: One quick and easy way to give electronically is by using the "Bill Pay" feature of your bank's website. This service is normally provided free of charge both to you (the bank's customer) and to the church. And when you give online using a recurring payment, you never have to worry about forgetting your checkbook or being out of town. Instead, your gift can be deducted automatically from your account without you ever having to manually write a check.

Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your IRA: Once you reach age 72, you are required to take annual Required Minimum Distributions (RMD's) from your retirement accounts. If you want to avoid paying income tax on your distribution, you can contribute to a charity, in this example, the **Chapel in the Pines**. Example: If your required minimum distribution is \$20,000 and your tax rate is 32%, you owe income tax of \$6,400 to the government. Donate \$20,000 to the Chapel and its tax-free.

Life Insurance: Every life insurance policy has a Death Benefit. The death benefit is received tax-free by the "primary" beneficiary. Insurance companies permit you to add a "contingent beneficiary" in case the primary beneficiary dies before the policyholder. As a policy holder, you can name Chapel in the Pines, as a beneficiary. Find your life insurance policy and look inside the very back of the policy. You will see a copy of your original application. On there, you will see the names or names of your beneficiaries. If they need updating or if you want to include the Chapel as a beneficiary, contact your agent or insurance company. Better yet, call me, **Dick Van Horne**, and I'll walk you through the process.
