Homily

Mary vs. Judas...Who Gets Jesus?

Maundy Thursday is just around the corner and reflecting on the scripture for that evening, I want to say to all of you right now...nobody is going to wash my feet! I don't know about you but that would make me very uncomfortable. It's just too much. Why should anyone put themselves in that position for me? Anyway, after fifty years of playing tennis and years of running...my feet just aren't that inviting to say the least.

But, unlike me, Jesus seems very comfortable having fragrant oil intimately massaged into his feet by Mary as she wipes his feet with her hair...and he walked everywhere and only wore sandals...so just imagine what shape his feet were in! What is it that allows him to accept this so willingly and so unselfconsciously? Might it be that he has such an inflated opinion of himself that he expects folks to fawn all over him like this?

Well, the gospel writer is not going to allow us that interpretation, because on the next page we find Jesus on what we call Holy Thursday, down on the floor with a bowl of water and a towel...washing the feet of his disciples...and amazingly, he seems just as comfortable doing this to others as he is in receiving it from others. Clearly, this is not an arrogant Jesus...no, what he is saying is that his wish would be for all people to treat each other this way.

Let us pray...May the words...Amen

Yet, when Mary massages his feet it is not only an extravagant act of devotion...it is also financially extravagant as well. Now, it's probably a bit of poetic hyperbole but John tells us that the perfumed oil Mary uses was valued at about a year's wages. I believe it's at this point, that most of us would be up there with Judas, making a protest...thundering that the oil could have been sold and the proceeds used to help some of the poor and starving people who live and work right in our own community.

Wait a minute, don't you imagine that Judas was feeling pretty good about taking this stand because during his ministry, Jesus had said much about the poor and the importance of responding to their needs with care and compassion and generosity. So, you would think that Judas was about to receive a welcomed pat on the back from Jesus.

Yet, not only is Jesus not O.K. with Judas' comments, but he immediately holds Mary up as a model of what getting it right looks like...and contrasts it to Judas' outburst as a model of getting it all wrong.

This is a turning point in John's Gospel. This is where Jesus starts talking openly about the impossibility of his mission ending anywhere other than with his conviction and execution...and he also begins to see that some of his followers "get it" and some don't.

Jesus says that Mary is anointing his body for burial. In other words...she gets it. She is not fighting him like Peter and Judas...suggesting that he should find some other way. No, she gets it. She sees that there is no other way. Inevitably Jesus will need to make this unimaginable sacrifice of love. Mary gets it and Jesus describes her loving foot massage as her devoted preparation of him for burial.

But, why would Judas' plea on behalf of the poor be dismissed as "not getting it"? Surely, he too is on the right track to understanding what Jesus' mission is all about.

Well, sort of, but not really.

Real service to the poor is always about actual service to particular people...not just general distant do-gooding. And, while there are times and places when we need to be sober and measured and careful, so as to ensure that our resources meet the most urgent needs of as many as possible...most of the time, the gospel call to love others as Jesus loves us means to lavish whatever we have on those immediately in front of us...and to do it right now.

Extravagant generosity to one might not bring an end to poverty, but it is a sign of the new culture of God...and that's what Jesus is saying when he taught, "you will always have the poor with you." This is not a statement of resignation. He is not saying, "Well, there's just nothing we can do to end poverty, so don't worry about it". Rather, he is saying that as good Christians out working in the world in the name of Jesus, we will never lack opportunities to serve the poor...opportunities will be all around us...so Jesus wants us to understand where true care and compassion begin. They begin with knowing the love and freedom of God through Christ.

They begin in experiencing the freedom to respond in extravagant devotion to the one who would rather get himself nailed to a cross by the powers that be, than allow the violence of their exploiting and poverty causing behavior to go unchallenged. For it is when we truly grasp how extravagantly generous God has been to us...and how reciprocating that generosity to others...is actually showering our love and devotion on him...then we will find ourselves really growing in compassion and motivated to care for the needy victims of this world.

Actually, when you think about it...what we are doing here this morning is pretty extravagant. We will spend a couple of valuable hours expressing our love and devotion to the crucified and risen Messiah. Some might say...as Judas did...that spending two hours like this is wasteful, when we could be out in our community, together, doing something useful for our neighbors in need.

But, Jesus said that it was Mary who got it...not Judas. But, we better not hide behind that either. Yes, Jesus did affirm her in her honoring of his chosen pathway to the cross and her devotion to him as the one who carries the sin of all the broken victims of this world...who carries the pain of all the poor and needy. And, if we are actually getting it too...as Mary got it...then the apparent extravagance of our worship here this morning, will surely give birth to a holy compassion and a call to action that will take flesh through us in service to others. And, that is certainly something that we should celebrate this Lenten season and beyond.

The Prayers of the People

Lord God, how extravagant your love for us is! You continually pour upon us blessing upon blessing - in the lives of people near and dear to us, in the beauty of creation, in the skills and abilities you have given to us. There is so much for which we are thankful.

Yet, in the midst of this thankfulness, there lurks the demons of demand and confusion. We want you to be in control of taking care of all the things the things the taking care of all the taking the taking care of all the taking the taking taking

We want you to be in control of taking care of all the things that threaten us. We want you to prevent us from facing times of confusion and doubt. Actually, we want to have a more complete faith.

Like Judas, who misunderstood Jesus' intention, we wonder about the anointing of Jesus - about the perceived waste of materials. How hard it is for us to see that we need to take some time to honor and praise Christ instead of continually asking for Christ to do things for us.

We have a lot to learn. Lord, teach us!

Open our hard hearts to the healing words you have for us.

Give us patience and persistence in our service to you.

And when we stumble and thrash around faithlessly,

bring us back into your presence...bring us back home;
that we may find healing and hope. In Jesus' name, we pray. AMEN.

A Service of Diminishing Light - Witness at the Cross

The Women

The gospel writers agree that numerous women were an important part of Jesus' ministry from the very beginning, but they provide different details of who they were and what roles they played.

The gospel writers all agree that there were women at the cross, but which women and where they were when they witnessed the crucifixion is not always consistent in the four different records. The only thing on which all four evangelist agree is that Mary Madelene was consistently involved in the life and ministry of Jesus from his time in Galilee, to the cross, and finally all the way to the empty tomb and beyond.

The Gospel of Mark says that there were women looking on from a distance as Jesus is crucified but he only names three of them...Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James the younger and Joses, and Salome. Mark's gospel also includes another Mary...Mary the sister of Lazarus...whose story we heard this morning...the one who anointed Jesus for his burial.

Matthew also says that there were women who witnessed the crucifixion of Jesus but the only ones he lists by name are Mary Magdalene; Mary the mother of James and Joseph; and the mother of Jesus' disciples, James and John.

In Luke's version, instead of individual women, we are given the image of a group of women that he calls "The Daughters of Jerusalem" who line the street as Jesus carries his cross down the Via Dolorosa to Golgotha where he will be crucified. These women are beating their breasts as a sign of morning and they are weeping over the torture and upcoming death of a prophet and healer, who has been falsely accused and is most certainly innocent. These women also stood at a distance and witnessed the execution of Jesus.

The Gospel of John relocates all of the women to the very foot of the cross but he only names four...Mary the mother of Jesus, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. Only in John is Jesus' mother explicitly said to be at the cross and tasked with doing what no mother would ever want to do...watching their child die a horribly painful and public death.

The author of the Gospel of John leaves us with one more scene that influences our understanding of the women at the cross, and in particular, the mother of Jesus. In his farewell discourse Jesus says, "When a woman is in labor, she has pain, because her hour has come. But when her child is born, she no longer remembers the anguish because of the joy of having brought a human being into the world. So you have pain now; but I will see you again, and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you."

The women, especially Jesus' mother, who gather at the cross to witness Jesus' death carry that pain and anguish that the death of a loved one prompts. But their hearts will rejoice because the cross is never the end of the story.

As we contemplate the image of the women weeping along the Via Delarosa, the women watching the horror from a distance, and the courageous women at the foot of the cross, we have moved one step closer to the darkness of the crucifixion when the powers and principalities of this world will strive to diminish the light of Christ.
